
So it is little wonder that the new surgeries at The Family Dental Care East Lothian are breathing fresh vitality into their practice with beautifully vibrant colours. Having bloomed from a former incarnation of three surgeries rotating six dentists, the new clinic will now have 10 surgeries and 10 dentists, aided by 15 support staff, all serving patients who will have the privilege of experiencing a new

A five-room, state-of-the-art LDU guarantees the most modern and "best practice" sterilisation facilities, probably the most up-to-date currently in the UK. And with colour-coded rooms and dedicated corridors for cross-infection procedures and patient access, the new practice emerges from the echoes of the past to set a benchmark for the future.

Seven years in the making, the ultimate ambition was to reverse the shortage of available NHS dentistry in the area and provide dental care that was accessible to anyone. With such a worthwhile goal, the local Member of Scottish Parliament placed his support directly behind the new clinic. A canny site was acquired on the shore across from a supermarket, ensuring that not only will a multitude of patients find their way into the practice, but they will



benefit from the convenience of the location too.

Even though the practice is future-proof in its design, the building in which it is located pays homage to the gallantry of the past, being named for Spitfire pilot Pat Gifford from World War II. The boomerang-shaped building is a new architectural marvel, and its memorial to a wartime pilot has its counterpoint in this luminous new practice winning the battle for dental health in Scotland.

Contractor Simon Pearce, from McKillop Dental, was recommended to the practice by a local dental engineer and proved invaluable in the development stages, offering both hands-on experience and advice.

a patient; the next day the pain hits and you're barely able to move.

"One example in 2012 was of a 26-year-old dentist whose back pain left him unable to work for over three months, which he didn't expect at his age. We paid him over £10,000 in benefits for this period, which meant that at least he didn't have additional financial worries on top of dealing with his back pain."

The other significant reason for dentists being off sick from work, and cited above as a reason for premature retirement, is psychiatric disorders, which accounted for 15 per cent of male and 16 per cent of female claims paid by Dentists' Provident in 2013.

Bryan continues: "Psychological disorders such as anxiety, stress and depression can hit dentists at any age, and are often brought about by their working situation. This can obviously have a significant impact on them and their ability to work, as well as on their personal lives.

"In our experience, dentists who are unable to work due to illness or injury are keen to return to work as soon as possible. Our claims team build relationships with our members, and have an ongoing dialogue with them to discuss their

progress and chat through how their treatment or recovery is progressing.

"If a member expresses a desire to return to work, then we work with them to see how we can help them with this, including assisting them to get the best out of their care plan and providing financial support if they wish to go back to work parttime."
